

  - Try using a toothpick, palette knife, or similar to scratch lines into your drawing (called sgraffito), to create patterns and texture. This works best when many layers of color have

### OIL PASTELS HOW TO GUIDE

TIPS FOR IMPLEMENTING

### VISUAL JOURNALS:

- Provide this guide for students working in their visual journal.
- Go through the list of ways oil pastels can be incorporated into a work of art.
- Encourage students to experiment with oil pastels on a separate sheet of paper before starting in their visual journal.
- Students can recreate the apple in their visual journal, as a warm up before working in their visual journal, or follow some of the suggestions to create color blocking, add patterns, enhance a collage, and similar.

#### SKETCHBOOK:

- Pass the handout for students to use as a guide in their sketchbook.
- Demonstrate basic blending and layering techniques.
  - Show how to block colors before overlapping and blending.
  - o Show how to work from light to dark.
  - Use the background to help clean up the drawing.
- Have students follow the steps to create the apple drawing.
- Light them create two more drawings of their choice using oil pastels.



**HOW TO & TIPS** 

## USING OIL PASTELS


#### SUPPLIES:

- · Oil pastels, a variety of colours
- · Baby oil, stand oil, or mineral spirits (optional)
- · Q-tips (optional)
- · Toothpicks, palette knife, or other pointed objects to scratch lines into the drawing. (optional)
- Fixative



#### WAYS TO USE OIL PASTELS:

- · Add a background colour.
- · Create a blend from one colour to and · Add a colour blocked design.
- Draw and colour an object.
- · Blend over a collaged layer to highligh and torn edges of the paper,
- Add lines and patterns.
- Write words (easiest when writing large



#### STEP ONE:

Lightly draw a shape or object you want to add colour to. Stick with colours in the object you are drawing or choose a fun, bright colour that peeks out around the edges of your drawing for a pop of colour.



STEP TWO:

Block in colours, slightly overlapping them as you go. With oil pastels it's best to work light to dark. Colours can easily become muddy if you try to work dark to light.





STEP THREE

Use light colours to blend the layer of oil pastel together. Once blende add details such as lines, patterns texture, or sharpen up highlights ar shadows using the edge of your o


STEP TRREE.




