TEACHER NOTES

- Use this as a first day activity or a review during the first week of school.
 - TIP: use the first day to go over syllabus and similar and do a more relaxed activity such as drawing musical chairs, fill out a get to know you sheet, decorating portfolios, keep it light. Start the presentations on the second day, finish up on day 3, start your first project on day 4.
 - First day tips: https://lookbetweenthelines.com/7-art-teacher-tips-for-back-to-school/
 - If your class meets for 90 minutes start the elements of art presentation the second half of class.

FIRST DAY ACTIVITY:

- Start class by assigning seats, going over class procedures, the syllabus, and pointing out the location of supplies and similar.
- Show the elements of art presentation, going through every element.
 - Students should be filling in their note sheet as you move through slides.
 - Engage students in discussions as you go. This is a great time to ask for names as they answer questions.
- Pass out either the blank elements of art handout size or the blank poster size or both for students to work on for students to work on.
 - Have the students keep the handout size in their art notebook or similar to reference as needed.
 - Collect the posters, pick one to hang in the classroom and out in the hall.
 Periodically rotate them out.
- Show the principles of design presentation on the second day of school, have students decorate their notetaking sheet and handout/poster of the principles.
 Display with the elements of art.

FIRST WEEK ACTIVITY:

- On the second day of school start with the elements of art presentation, engage students in a discuss and have them fill out the notetaking sheet as you move through the slides.
 - O Pass out the elements of art handout and/or poster size sheets for students to decorate.
- On the third day of school show the principles of design presentation, engage students in a discuss and have them fill out the notetaking sheet as you move


