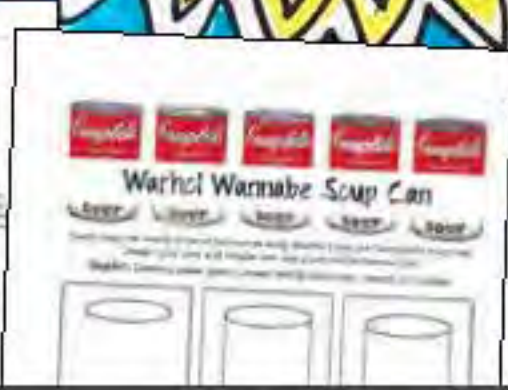
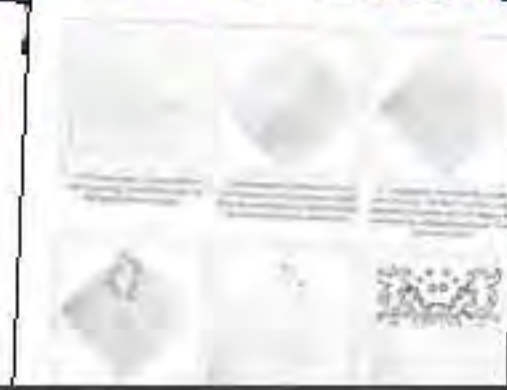

## Andy Warhol



ABOUT THE ARTIST



1. Andy Warhol worked for only a few years but became one of the most famous artists in the world. He was a pioneer in the use of mass production in art.
2. Andy Warhol created the first soup can print in 1962. He used a silk screen printing technique to create his prints.
3. Andy Warhol's prints are made from a stencil. He used a screen to create the design and then poured ink through it onto a piece of paper.
4. Andy Warhol's prints are made from a stencil. He used a screen to create the design and then poured ink through it onto a piece of paper.
5. Andy Warhol started his art career as a commercial artist. He designed logos and advertisements for many companies.
6. Andy Warhol's art is similar to what a graphic designer does today. He has many drawings and paintings of things from his life, such as a car, a chair, and a shoe.

**ANY FACT:** Silk screen printing is a process that separates ink through a screen onto paper, fabric, or other surfaces. A design is created by laying a stencil on the screen, the ink goes through the cut out part of the stencil, but the blocked ink from moving through the...

- **Form:** The illusion of a three dimensional shape or the actual shape of a three dimensional object.
- **Sphere:** a three dimensional circle.
- **Cone:** A three dimensional triangle. A round bottom with sides that converge to a point.
- **Cylinder:** a three dimensional form with parallel lines and a round top and bottom.
- **Bilateral symmetry:** A design made by creating a mirror image of another image across a vertical and/or horizontal line. The design is symmetrical with mirror images of a design.

IMPLEMENTATION: for a 40 minute class

DAY 1: Wacky Warhol

- Begin class with the presentation. If time is tight, skip the presentation and go straight to an in person demo or show the demo video. The demo video can also be used to catch students up who miss class.
- Introduce the artist to know: Andy Warhol. Go over fun facts and information.
- Introduce their project.
- Show the project steps. TIP: do an in person demo as you walk through the steps.
- Encourage a wide range of learning styles.

4 PAGES

Today:

- Fold your paper in half twice.
- Open it up, draw a profile with a shirt and hair at a diagonal in one of the quadrants.
- Trace over the design using a black marker.
- Fold your paper in half, trace over your design.
- Flip your paper over, trace over the lines you just drew.
- Fold your paper it in half, trace both of the drawings.
- Unfold your paper and trace over the lines on the opposite side of the paper.

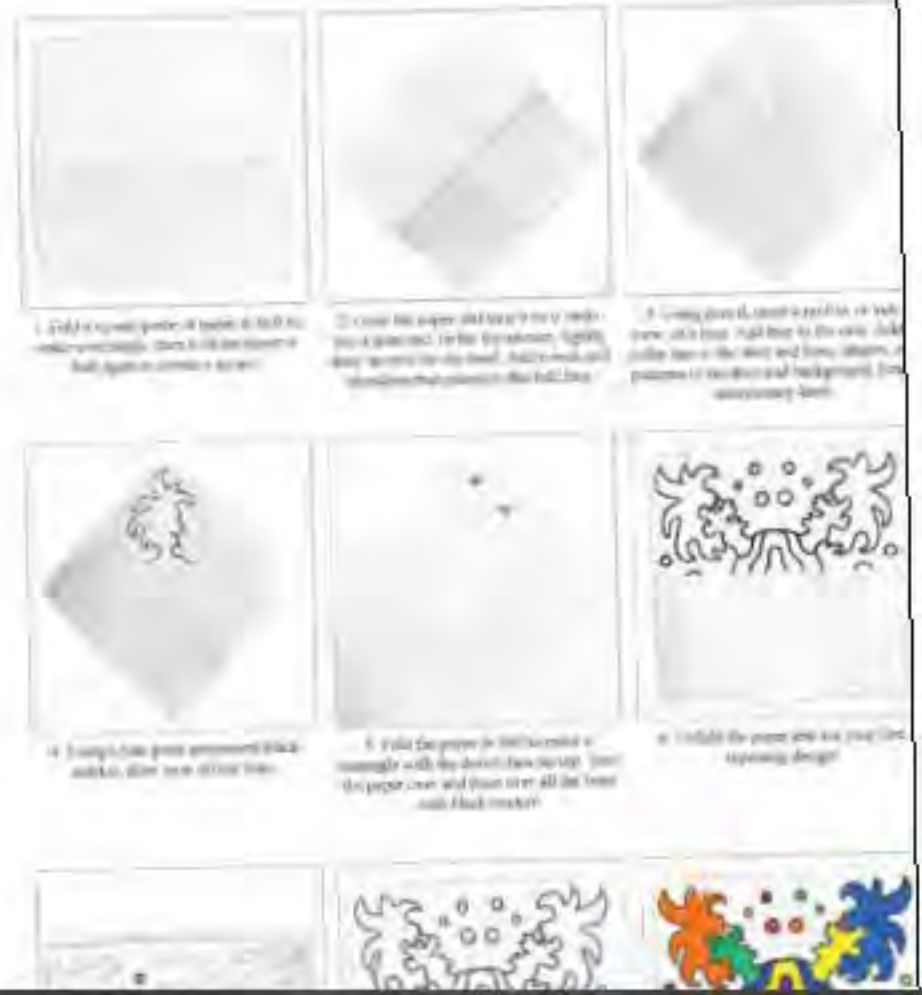

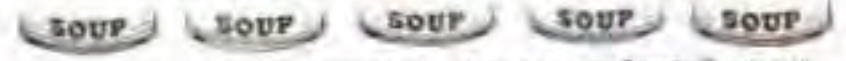

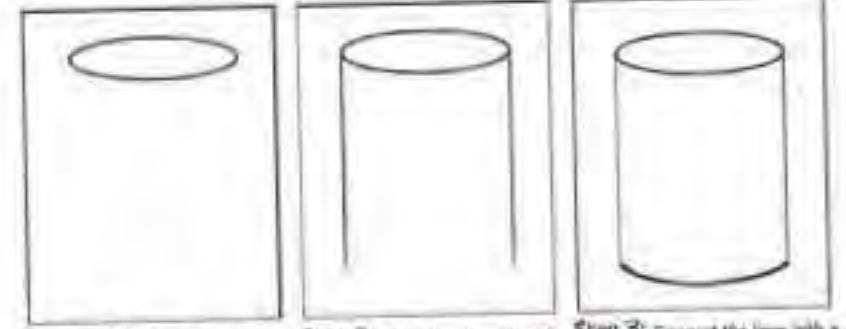


### Warhol Wannabe Soup Can



Every soup can wants to be as famous as Andy Warhol's pop art Campbell's soup can. Design your own and maybe one day yours will be famous too!

Supplies: Drawing paper, pencil, eraser, felt tip black pen, crayons or markers.



Step 1: Draw an oval.  
Step 2: Draw two lines straight down from the sides of the oval.  
Step 3: Connect the lines with a curved line at the bottom.  
Tip: All curved lines should meet at the bottom curved line of the oval.



Step 4: Draw curved lines at the top and bottom of your soup can for the label. Add light curved lines to the can as shown.  
Step 5: Add color to your newly designed soup can!

# Andy Warhol

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Andy Warhol (1928-1987) was an American artist, and the most famous of the Pop Art movement. Warhol is known for his screen prints of everyday objects such as Campbell's Soup, and his self-portraits, as well as his celebrity images of people, such as Marilyn Monroe and Jackie K.



1. **Andy Warhol** was born in 1928 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He was the oldest of five children. He was a very successful commercial artist and graphic designer.

2. **Andy Warhol** became a leading figure in the Pop Art movement. He is known for his screen prints of everyday objects such as Campbell's Soup, and his self-portraits, as well as his celebrity images of people, such as Marilyn Monroe and Jackie K.

3. **Andy Warhol** is credited with creating the first "15 minutes of fame." He often reproduced himself as a celebrity, including in his own portraits.

4. **Andy Warhol's** most famous work is his screen prints of Marilyn Monroe. He also created the first "15 minutes of fame" by creating a portrait of himself that lasted only 15 minutes.

5. **Andy Warhol** started his art career as a commercial artist, similar to what a graphic designer does today. He has many drawings and paintings of shoes from his 3 years working as an illustrator for a shoe manufacturer.

6. **Andy Warhol's** last name is actually Warhola. He dropped the 'a' after seeing a drawing credit that misspelled his name to Andy Warhol.

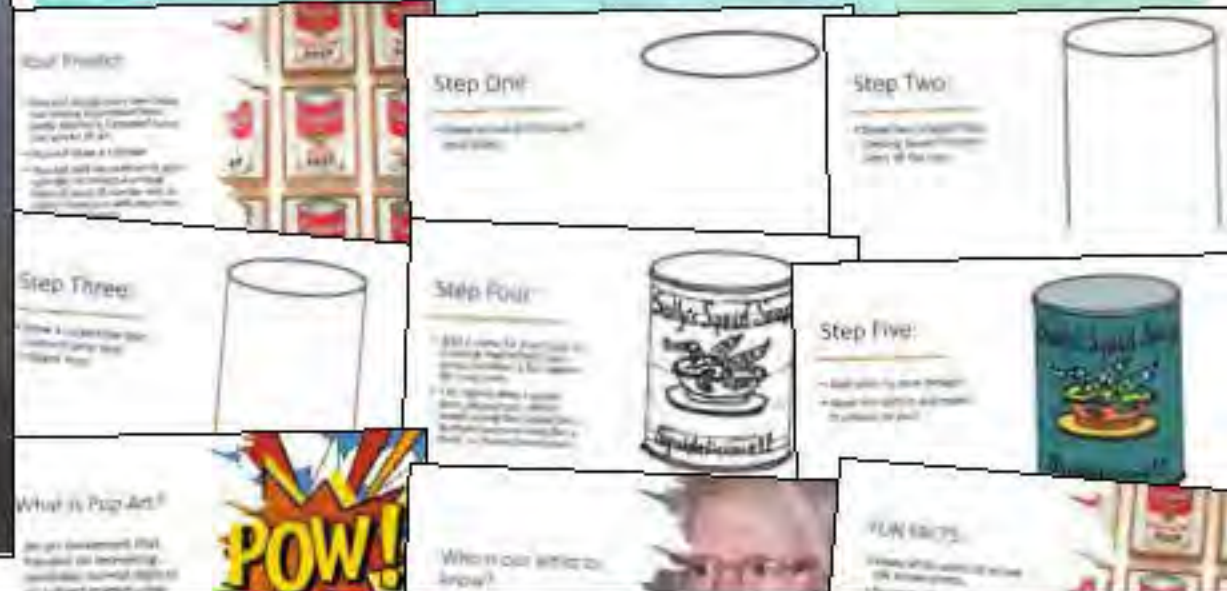
